### The Foundations of Christian Montessori

People will often ask what is the difference between Montessori education and traditional education. And some will ask what is the difference between Christian Montessori and regular Montessori. The partial answer to both questions lies in the following six foundational concepts:

- 1. Christ-centered
- 2. Stewardship
- 3. Respect
- 4. Observation

These concepts form Montessori

- 5. Modeling
- 6. Principles

education long before we get to the traditional answers about Montessori being hands on with a prepared environment etc. The first two on our list Christ-centered and stewardship – are definitive markers between parochial and non-parochial Montessori education. **Respect** which is a hallmark of Montessori should be a standard in Christian education. But this profound respect is often conspicuous by its absence. Needless to say, this sad phenomenon of lack of respect happens in Montessori as well when we lose sight of the overall function and goal of this way of nurturing and educating.

The purpose of the fellowship is to gently remind us monthly (in the midst

of all of the turmoil of real life) what our real goals and purposes are.

**Observation** is unique to Montessori in the pedagogical field. In traditional school we tend to have our minds made up (and our curriculum) and we deliver both without a seeming regard to or input from the student in front of us.

It is the next foundational concept – **modeling** – that is often overlooked in all forms of teaching. Dr. Montessori's emphasis on modeling is a major component of a teacher's preparation.

#### **Modeling**

Ironically, many of the great lessons of life are not communicated verbally. Much of the most profound teaching that children receive comes to them by **observation** and not by hearing. James 1:22 tells us to "be doers of the word and not hearers only." Which also means to be doers and not just speakers. Talk the talk, walk the walk but most importantly walk the talk.

Dr. Montessori was given a unique insight in that most presentations are to be given with few words – unlike most traditional teaching. This is a type of "isolation of difficulties" which allows the child to focus on what is being done and not be distracted by the audio presentation. When the guide is trained the emphasis is on precise and specific movements. It is this precision that is modeled for the child. It is this precision that the child is expected to produce.

Montessori "instruction" is based largely on this type of modeling for the student.

Sometimes our children are too precise in their production per this classic story. A little girl was observed washing dishes and every thirty seconds or so would fling some water with her right hand over her left forearm and thirty seconds later would fling water with her left hand over her right forearm continuing like this until she was finished with the exercise. Needless to say, the guides were puzzled until one day Sister Mary was observed giving the dishwashing presentation. As Sister Mary was concentrating on washing the dishes the sleeve of her habit descended into the dishwater. Smoothly, she moved her right forearm over the descending left sleeve and pushed it back out of the water. In a little while, it was the descending right sleeve that was pushed out of the water by the left forearm, and this continued throughout the exercise. AHA! The power of observation and modeling!

The challenge for us is that our children model themselves not just on our presentations but on all of our actions. A parent once shared with my wife that her little girl would line up her dolls and teddy bears and read them a story (like Mrs. Fidellow). The parent asked, "But why in the middle of the story does she go 'ah, ah, ah' and then continue?" Barbara laughed recognizing her action of trying to correct a child whose fingers were being introduced into his nose. (She found another way to deal with that.)

We forget that they watch us, not only when we make presentations, but in every action and attitude. It does no good to tell them to do what we say when they cannot ignore what we do. And we fool ourselves if we think that only our actions are copied, even our words and attitudes are precisely engraved into the minds, hearts and actions of our children. We can't hide from our children. We are transparent to them. Our only saving grace is that they do not yet know that our less than desirous qualities are really not desirous and that is not what they need to model. So it puts us on a tightrope. If we choose to be guides we submit ourselves to a higher calling of action, words, and attitudes.

In teaching, we not only have to look around us but within us as well. Psalm 51 is a guide for the guides. "Surely you desire truth in the inner parts; you teach me wisdom in the inmost place" (v.6) "Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me." (v10) "Restore to me the joy of your salvation and grant me a willing spirit, to sustain me." (v12) "O Lord, open my lips and my mouth will declare your praise." (v15) "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise." (v17)

Montessori teaching is more than education – it is life itself when you fulfill the call to meet the child's needs intellectually, physically, emotionally and spiritually. Dr. Montessori spends a great deal of time talking about the spiritual preparation of the teacher. That preparation is both in training and in the daily entry to the classroom. If we treat our classrooms as holy places (wherever God is - is holy) then our behavior changes, our preparation changes. Matthew 18:10 reminds us, "See that you don't look down on one of these little ones. For I tell you that their angels in heaven always see the face of my

Father in Heaven." We tend to forget that we touch eternity everyday. It is tough to remember with all of things we have to do and all of the things we are concerned with for today.

Interestingly, there are "sensitive periods" all around us and not just the ones Dr. Montessori identified. We might consider them "critical periods" not just for a child's development but for a child's life (and adults too!). Who knows at what point a child is making judgments of who they are, of who they are to become? Who knows at what point a child's self-image becomes indelibly stamped – pretty, ugly, smart, dumb, class-clown, nerd, beauty queen, jock or a myriad of other determinations?

Our modeling of Christ's heart, His love, His acceptance can make all the difference in a life yet to unfold. I wish I had known all this. I want you to know it now. We are involved in more than "just" teaching. Sure, we teach but we also impact. Once upon a time I would have said we mold the children but the child already has a God-given mold, one that has been DNA'd into him by His creator. What we do in our worst moments is to deform that mold and hinder that development and in our best moments we co-operate with a heavenly plan. Our best moments often are the quiet moments of our modeling – the ones we don't know they are watching but you know they are. (And their angels are watching too and telling God on us hopefully, they are telling Him the good things.)

Ultimately, it is not "Do as I say." But "Do as I do." – which they will do anyway!
