## **How Jesus comes to your classroom. Part 5**

Jesus comes to our classroom through the very classroom – the environment. The prepared environment, a unique emphasis in Montessori, by its very nature speaks of Christ. Consider the scripture from Colossians (1:16) “For by him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things were created by him and for him.”

If things are created by him and for him what do you think they look like? They are a reflection of him. He brings (and is) beauty and order. Sin is discord. Therefore our environments, which are purposely full of coherence, order and beauty are a reflection of the eternal God.

The aesthetics and order of the environment are not an afterthought but an integral part of the Montessori experience. And that experience should be one that is able to take in all the good that God has prepared for us.

I can hear you say – “If only I had the money...”. But this kind of experience is not dependent solely on money. It is built on cleanliness. It is built on having

a green pitcher with a green basin (they go together). It is having both china and crystal in the environment (it doesn't need to cost \$50 a plate) rather than plastic. Plastic has its appropriate uses but usually not for aesthetics.

So how does Jesus come forth in this? He comes forth by the beauty the children see and feel. He comes forth as you share why we, (you and the children), are good stewards of the environment because it belongs to Jesus. But then doesn't everything? And if it all belongs to Jesus and it is a reflection of him shouldn't it be as beautiful as possible?

People will try to convince you that little children take no notice of such things or it isn't important. We train the children in beauty by surrounding them with beauty. There is enough ugliness in the world for them to see the contrast. Beauty is a result of someone who cares – how about sunsets and apple trees and fluffy puppies?

Jesus comes to the classroom in beauty. And they see it because we point it out. It is the intricacies of life that are hidden and need to be taught. Beauty is more than skin deep or just a surface. There is beauty everywhere and by training our children in the aesthetic they begin to see the creator behind the patterns, the clouds and the sunsets. We teach Jesus' presence by creating an environment that reflects him (there is a beauty of holiness that the scripture speaks of). And there is a holiness to the beauty that God has provided. So we teach our children to worship the creator and not his reflection in the creation.

One further thought on the environment from Colossians. Jesus also created that which is invisible. And in each environment there is not only the

visible beauty but there is also present the invisible beautiful presence of Jesus himself. Remember the invisible beauty that Christ's spirit infuses into the environment because you have chosen to honor him and his creation (the children) in a manner that gives him great pleasure.

## **A Baker's Dozen of Montessori benefits for the children Number four**

What is one of the first phrases you would use when someone asks you to briefly describe Montessori? Hands on. And it is this "hands on" that is so distinctive and essential. I believe it was Aristotle that first observed that there is nothing in the mind that is not first in the hands. It is our multi-sensory approach in Montessori that gives, not only greater learning but deeper learning.

"Hands on" is the active employment of all senses focused on a goal. Why is it as adults that we doodle, drum our fingers, play with paper clips etc.? Because the "hands on" is a need. Children doing "hands on" work are less distracted and more focused. That is also why the playing of classical music in the classroom seems to help concentration because it helps remove the audio distraction of extraneous noise and replaces it with a soothing audio sensation.

Don't ever lose the love of the hands on because it meets so many needs. Consider that as adults we will often take a break from vigorous mental activity and do something physical - mow the lawn, do dishes, work out - and while in that process the mental activity becomes focused and answers that stubbornly refused to come, now come clearly.

Most of what was said last month about the benefits of practical life certainly apply to the hands on – muscular development, hand/eye coordination, organization, processing, following multi-step directions etc.

## **Holiday Ideas**

### **Fourth of July**

For those of you that operate during the summer the fourth of July offers wonderful opportunities to share about our wonderful country and our heritage and how God has blessed and continues to bless America.

Have a parade. Let the children, with their parents help, decorate their bikes, wagons, scooters, etc. and bring them to school.

Play patriotic music and have students carry the Christian flag and the American flag. Include the Parents. Share the history of why America is such a great nation. Salute the flags.

Then celebrate with an old fashioned picnic. Make homemade ice cream (use the old hand crank kind so every child can help). Serve the all American meal of hot dogs, potato salad, and baked beans. Use blueberries and strawberries to garnish the ice cream – red, white and blue.
