"On the Altars You've Built" A reflection about Valentine's

I awoke with that phrase on my mind as I awaited Valentine's Day. Let me explain the significance of those words as it has to do with our concept of Valentine's and love.

Valentine's is a special day for many reasons. Though it is not an "official" religious holiday, its roots have come to be associated with a Christian Bishop, Valentine of the third century, who provided dowries for poor young women. It is a worldly celebration of love.

Since I remain an incurable romantic, Valentine's has a special place in my heart. Having said that, I need to share with you three major thoughts about romance and love.

First, romance doesn't mean unrealistic. It doesn't mean blind (even though love is said to be blind).

Romance is an illusion, a dream, a vision – in the best sense of each of those words. It is a reality yet to unfold - a doorway to a better reality.

Scripture says that without a vision the people perish. And without dreams do we really live? But dreams without plans do not lead to a new reality.

Second, the word romance holds so many meanings. We think of a "romance" as a story. We think of it as a courtship. We think of it as actions, as emotions – as a "lived happily ever after". Paul Billheimer in "Destined for the Throne" (Bethany House Publishers isbn 0-87123-309-6) gives a whole new, different and dynamic perspective to "romance". He says the church is the central object and goal of history. From before time began, God's purpose was to have a bride for His Son. So every thing that happens in "The entire universe in its totality is cooperating with God in His purpose to select and train His Church as His Eternal Companion ... romance is at the heart of the universe and is key to all existence." All of history is a romance of love.

Third, romance, like love, is a desire to please. It is a deliberate effort to set the stage for love.

Most of us have been raised with the idea that love is a feeling. Our songs, our novels, our movies give voice to this view. However, God shares with us that love is an action. "For God so loved the world He gave..." and, "Faith (love) without works is dead."

We have to be careful that we don't confuse the wonderful feelings of love with the much harder actions that love requires. Interestingly, feelings will follow actions.

So where does the altar come in? First, we think of altars at marriage ceremonies, and that is a good place to put into perspective that love is one of God's great gifts to us. (We love because He first loved us. 1 John 4:19) But altars have also been created to mark places and times of God's deliverance and blessing and as places to worship.

Second, it is we who build the altars. Whether it is in the wilderness, the tabernacle or the temple, we construct the altars for worship and sacrifice. Sacrifice tends to have a negative tone. And yet sacrifice is defined as an act of offering to God of something precious.

Third, it is not the altar we worship but we worship at the altar.

And what altar has God created for you in your life? Where do you go each day an offer the best you have. Where do you do it to "the least of these" and you do it to God? Sometimes it feels like a sacrifice – and sometimes it is. At other times we are like Jacob working for Rachel's hand – "So Jacob served seven years to get Rachel, but they seemed like only a few days to him because of his love for her." (Genesis 29:20)

The altar you've built is a holy place. That is where God meets you everyday as you love the children that surround you. Mother Teresa said it is not how big the work we do is but how much love we put in to it.

I told you earlier that I was an incurable romantic (also an incurable idealist). Barbara and I were married on a Wednesday evening so Valentine's would always be our anniversary. This year we celebrate 76 years of wedded bliss – that's 38 years for each of us. Guys will say that I've got it easy. I only

have to buy one present for Valentine's and our anniversary. But guys, it had better be fantastic or you're in double trouble.

One final note from the romantic. One anniversary, fifteen or twenty years ago, I woke Barbara up on Valentine's day singing to her "Happy Birthday to me, Happy Birthday to me ..." "Silly, it's not your birthday, it's our anniversary." She said. To which I replied, "Honey, I wasn't living until I married you."

Happy Valentine's to all of you and Happy Anniversary honey.

The Icon of Faith Part 5

God gives us the child as a gift. Not a gift to do what we want with but a gift that shows us the way to our Heavenly Father. Hebrews 11:6 says, "Without faith it is impossible to please God." And in the child, God gives us an icon, a

model of what faith is in its purest and most simple form.

In Matthew 19:14, Jesus says, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of Heaven belongs to such as these." In Luke 18:16-17, He repeats the same words and goes on to say, "I tell you the truth; anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it."

To begin to understand how the child becomes this icon of faith – this representation – we need to explore what the kingdom of heaven is and how we enter into it.

Matthew 13:44-46 offers two parables that seem to be a contradiction of what Jesus normally taught. "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field. When a man found it, he hid it again, and then in his joy went and sold all he had and bought that field. Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant looking for fine pearls. When he found one of great value, he went away and sold everything he had and bought it."

The contradiction seems to be in the accumulation of wealth. (Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal." Matthew 6:19) For Jesus real treasure is never "treasure". It is beyond the physical. The deeper meaning of the parable rests on the object, the actions and the attitude.

For one man, the discovery was accidental. For the other, it was a deliberate search. However, both men's reaction to the discovery of the treasure, the thing of great value, was the same – they sold all they had to possess the treasure. We also have to note the attitude "in his joy" went and sold all he had.

They are remarkable stories detailing single mindedness. A total abandonment of everything else to possess the treasure. This is what children do with their faith. Totally believing, totally giving, totally living. Children will spend hours, days and weeks immersed in a project of passion – single mindedly.

Our challenge is to seek God with this same kind of passion as the merchant and as the child – selling all to possess the "treasure".

One further thought about abandoning all. It takes the same kind of passion to pursue the unique calling that God creates within each of us. Our unique personalities are the gift of God. And to fulfill that calling (artist, scientist, etc.) is to find that joy that God intends for life. Irving Stone in the novel, "The Agony and the Ecstasy", the story of Michelangelo, has his teacher telling him "Talent is cheap, art is expensive. It will cost you your life." To which Michelangelo replies, "What else is life for?"

It is that personality which is the calling. Montessori says (The Child in the Family), "The first duty of the educator ... is to recognize the human personality of the young being and respect it."
